

When you visit the **Azores**, one of the things that surprises you is the **color** of the water: from lakes, rivers and natural pools. The **island of São Miguel** has a **volcanic origin**, and this explains the wide variety of waters. There are **blue**, of course, and **green**, due to the rich bed, and **white** and **yellow**, of minerals and sulfur, and, finally, **red**, by the iron.

Going to Sete Cidades you find a series of lakes located in volcanic craters.

At **Furnas** there is the lake and plenty of space for its thermal waters.
